This 3-hour workshop is aimed at those preparing the formal report on their research study (e.g. thesis, project report) and who are considering submitting the work for publication. Novice and experienced researchers should benefit from the workshop. At the end of the course those attending should be able to:

- State why it's important to publish?
- Cite the different types of published reports
- Know how to choose a journal
- Understand common problems in writing
- Be aware of strategies to overcome the problems
- Prepare the manuscript
- Be familiar with the editorial process
- Be aware of what referees and editors are looking for
- Consider what to do if the manuscript is rejected
- Consider what to do if the manuscript is accepted

■ NRS PRIMARY CARE NETWORK SUPPORTED STUDY 1:

IMP²ART - IMPlementing IMProved Asthma self-management as RouTine

IMP²ART is a programme of work developing and testing a practical strategy to help practice staff deliver supported self-management for asthma as part of routine care.

GP practices must have a list size of 6,000 or more with at least 200 Asthma patients.

There is a control group and an intervention arm for this study. The Intervention arm requires team training and patient monitoring to fit within existing patient reviews and encourages patients to self-manage their Asthma. GP Practices need to be signed up to OPC to take part. Some practices may be asked to screen a patient list.

Practice reimbursement:

This will depend on if the practice is in the control or intervention arm of the study. Practices will receive a one-off £40 set-up fee from the researchers. Case Study Practices will receive £300.

Staff interviewed or asked for reports will be reimbursed at an hourly rate:

- ❖ GP rate £80/hour,
- ❖ Nurse, Practice Manager Rate £30/hour.
- ❖ Those practices which are asked to screen a patient list will receive £80-160 service support costs (depending on patient numbers) from the NRS Primary Care Network.

NRS PRIMARY CARE NETWORK SUPPORTED STUDY 2:

MULTICATH - A non-inferiority randomised controlled trial to compare mixed (multi/single-use) catheter management with single-use catheter management by intermittent catheter users over 12 months.

Aim of the study: This NIHR study is hoping to establish whether people who use intermittent catheterisation (IC) to empty their bladder, experience no more urinary tract infections reusing some of their catheters than they would using their standard care single-use catheters. 50% of the participants will be randomised to single-use catheters (usual care) with the other half randomised to the mixed-use strategy whereby participants will use a combination of single-use and multi-use catheters for 12 months. All the study will be conducted remotely because of COVID restrictions.

Practice involvement: Patient identification undertaken by NRS Primary Care Network searching on GP system, GPs will be asked to check the screening list for a small number of patients.

Practice reimbursement: £80-£240 depending on patient numbers.

Research Bulletin - April 2022 (Issue 74)

Supporting new funding, and development opportunities is critical to recovery of research within the NHS, and two new major funding calls have been announced his month by the Chief Scientist Office, alongside charity partners Wellbeing of Women, LifeArc and Muscular Dystrophy UK. A new NHS Scotland Innovation Fellowship Scheme will also launch next month helping to translate scientific research and technology into practice.

Streamlining systems and processes is also a focus, and as part of the Recovery Resilience and Growth programme, which aims to deliver on the actions set out in Saving and Improving Lives: The Future of UK Research Delivery, work is progressing to create a standardised national approach to costing for commercial contract research across the UK. Scotland already already operate a single price model for commercial research and updates on work to create an aligned UK process have been published on the NHS Research Scotland website

Also this month, a draft cancer strategy for Scotland has been published with a key aim to "enable an environment for research and innovation in diagnosis and treatment". The Scottish Government is seeking responses to the consultation; the NRS Neuroprogressive and Dementia Network marked World Parkinson's Day; NRS Oral and Dental has provided funding to launch two Patient and Public Involvement (PPI) projects; the BioDundee International Conference is now open for registration; and much more.

We hope you find this issue useful and as always, your ideas, feedback and contributions are welcome.


